Conductors Frank and Christian Rheinisch, Jarret and Brandon LaRose, and Philo Weir rode the circuit so many times that they must know every tie and turnout on the line. Program Meetings Draw SRO Crowds

At the Museum's first Program Meeting, held on July 10th at the Embassy Suites Hotel in San Luis Obispo, 125 people vied for the 99 available seets. Undaunted, veteran railfans adapted by leaning on the wall, sitting on the floor, or just plain standing. After the two hour meeting, no calls for Paramedics or massage therapists were needed. Railroad experts were pleased to report that the meeting was considered a "Safety Success."

Guest speakers at the July meeting included Barry Howard, museum designer, the man behind the design of Sacramento's California State Railroad Museum. Jeff Hook,

Associate Planner with the City of San Luis Obispo talked about the Freighthouse Restoration Project.

Union Pacific Railroad Special Agent Terry Masters, spoke on the subject of railroad safety and Operation Lifesaver. Prominent local designer Pierre Rademaker explained some of his ideas for the Historic Railroad District.

Entertainment was provided by the San Luis Obispo Little Theater, with Darryl Templeton and Dean Koker, singing a rousing medley of railroad songs. At the end of the evening a drawing was held and well over 50 donated prizes were given away. The October 9th Program Meeting featured Michael Broggie, author of Walt Disney's Railroad Story and recognized expert on the career and personal history of Walt Disney.

Michael's connection to Disney began when his father, Roger Broggie, became Disney's first *Imagineer*. As a child, Michael took rides on *Uncle Walt's* backyard railroad, the *Carolwood Pacific*. After college, Michael worked as a writer at the Disney Studio marketing department.

The highlight of Michael's talk was the showing of *home movies* of Walt playing with his backyard railroad.

Steam Locomotive Restoration . . .

steam locomotive running up and down the museum track along side the restored 1894 Southern Pacific Freighthouse. Just think of how tourists will feel as they step off the Amtrak Coast Starlight to the sounds of a clanging bell and the steam whistle of the museum's 1927 Baldwin 0-4-2RT steam locomotive. As their attention is drawn to the sounds, they will see San Luis Obispo Bailroad Museum's #7 with

Imagine the sight of our own

As their attention is drawn to the sounds, they will see San Luis Obispo Railroad Museum's #7 with steam slowly rising from the stack. Soon the beast (the locomotive, not the engineer) comes alive. It moves with puffs of barking steam shooting skyward. A small train follows the locomotive to the end of the track near the station. People move toward this unexpected diversion. Excited children with parents in tow yell, "Can we ride on it? Please!" What a sight to see!

What's it take to put it all together? The answer is simple: museum volunteer workers. Plenty of hard work, lots of money. Simple, right? These are the ingredients for the steam locomotive restoration.

The museum steam locomotive, a Baldwin 0-4-2RT (rear tank) is oper-

ational and is occasionally run for testing purposes. It is not yet restored to the level that is necessary for public presentation. The long, ongoing process of disassembly, cleaning, repair, painting and replacement, is a big and expensive project. It is well worth the effort. There are many museum members

who appreciate steam locomotives and donate their time toward the restoration of #7. Most of this time is really hard work. The only component that is missing is lots of money. We need cash! No doubt about it! We have the gigantic gift of the steam locomotive from Phil Goldman. Many museums never realize the dream of having a steam locomotice, operational or static. We

have one that is operational. All we

need to do is restore it.

To further this goal, we have completed a survey of needed materials and repairs for the full restoration of #7. Jim McEntire, SLORRM Engineer, Brad LaRose, President of SLORRM, and Duane Powell, SLORRM Director, along with outside professional sources have determined that the following are

determined that the following are necessary: Boiler tubes replaced; injectors restored; smoke stack restored; sand boxes made serviceable; upgrade steam piping; replace steam valves in the cab; replace wood floor boards; paint locomotive inside and out. Estimated cost of complete restoration \$10,000.00.

Jim McEntire, Art Laidlaw, Duane Powell, and Brad LaRose have just completed the restoration of the water tank/fuel bunker. The tank is a 300 gallon riveted steel U shaped container for water that the locomotive uses to make steam. The fuel bunker is within the U and was originally designed to hold either

damaged in an accident.

In order to perform the restoration, the tank had to be removed from the locomotive. The damaged portion on the back of the tank was cut out, leaving the orginal hot rivets around the outer edges. While the tank was open the men laborically always the part from the

coal or wood. Built in 1927, the tank

was rusted, leaking, and had been

the tank was open the men laboriously cleaned the rust from the inside. The entire inside was then sprayed with a plastic sealant. The tank has been replaced on the locomotive. The water tank sight glass in the cab has been restored.
